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Modern Homes Forecast 2026

Welcome to the James Hardie Modern Homes Forecast 2026 - our third annual research report created to inspire homeowners and trade professionals with the latest modern home design styles.

The James Hardie Modern Homes Forecast 2026 is our most future-focused report to date. Developed in partnership with global trend forecasting company, WGSN, it translates global design signals and local consumer data to deliver a forward-looking perspective on residential housing in New Zealand and Australia.

This year, we initiated a robust, multi-layered research process to ensure our insights are not only forward-looking but also anchored in tangible market shifts and global design movements. James Hardie and WGSN attended Salone Del Mobile Milano 2025 to conduct on-the-ground research that captured tangible shifts in architecture, materials and home living. In parallel, WGSN applied its methodology for trend prediction to interpret these signals. The methodology integrates WGSN's proprietary STEPIC framework - Society, Technology, Environment, Politics, Industry and Creativity - and draws on a wide range of data sources, expert networks and bespoke secondary research. This dual approach ensures our observations are both grounded in what's happening now and predictive of what's next.

This year's Forecast is grounded in the theme of Creative Expression - a guiding principle shaped by the insights gathered through our expanded research process. It recognises that homes are no longer static structures, but dynamic environments that reflect identity, support wellbeing, and adapt to life's evolving rhythms. In a time of economic pressure, climate urgency and social change, creativity has emerged as a tool for resilience, optimism and personal agency.

The Forecast decodes these insights into four Lifestyle Themes representing a distinct set of needs and aspirations. These themes are expressed through eight Modern Looks, each refined to reflect the changing expectations of New Zealand homeowners. From the playful optimism of Mid-Century Modern to the restorative calm of Japandi, the looks offer a blueprint for homes that are culturally attuned and designed to support contemporary living.

Box Modern

Box Modern embraces modular design with dynamic cubic forms, flexible layouts, and bold accents, creating adaptable homes that invite creativity and personal expression.

Modern Farmhouse

Modern Farmhouse balances rustic charm with contemporary efficiency, featuring pavilion-style layouts, grounded colours, and durable materials for resilient, family-friendly living.

Modern Heritage

Modern Heritage blends preserved architectural character with modern extensions, layering rich textures and bold colours to create homes that honour the past while embracing the future.

Barn

Barn elevates rural inspiration with dramatic rooflines and layered materials, offering bold silhouettes and restorative comfort in any setting.

Japandi

Japandi fuses minimalist structure with nature-led design, prioritising passive design principles, intuitive flow, and crafted simplicity for tranquil, enduring homes.

Modern Bach

Modern Bach brings seaside calm into urban spaces, using open layouts, natural light, and warm colours to create relaxed, elevated homes built for the Kiwi climate.

Mid-Century Modern

Mid-Century Modern celebrates architectural clarity and layered warmth, combining clean lines, modular layouts, and vibrant accents for timeless, expressive living.

Modern Classic

Modern Classic softens European elegance with approachable layouts and biophilic touches, creating harmonious spaces for multigenerational living.

What's New in 2026

This year marks a defining moment in New Zealand home living. The way homes are imagined, designed and lived in continues to evolve - shaped by cultural shifts, technological disruption, climate urgency and economic pressure. The James Hardie Modern Homes Forecast 2026 captures this evolution through the STEPIC framework: Society, Technology, Environment, Politics, Industry and Creativity.

STEPIC identifies the global and local forces driving long-term change in New Zealand. These reflect the industry realities and consumer expectations that define what's both possible and practical in the housing sector.



STEPIC

In 2024, the home was a space of questioning. The pandemic had disrupted daily life, prompting people to reevaluate their values, identities and priorities. Social norms were evolving, and the rise of digitally native consumers introduced new expectations around flexibility and tech-enabled design. Industry 5.0 began to take shape - an emerging approach that blends advanced technologies like AI and robotics with human-centric values. Climate concerns saw people reconnecting with nature, while the need for more resilient buildings grew. DIY and renovations slowed, and economic hardship brought people back into their homes to seek comfort and familiarity.

By 2025, the mood had shifted to action. Burnout, affordability pressures and climate urgency were no longer abstract concerns - they were shaping how people lived. Homes were being redefined as spaces that needed to do more: support remote work,

caregiving, fitness, and even income generation. Anxiety and stress were driving the need for connection and joy, making them essentials rather than luxuries. AI was augmenting the design industry with new materials and methods, reducing barriers to innovation. Sustainable design became mandatory as the impacts of climate change became more evident. Cost-of-living concerns intensified, and the dream of home ownership was under threat. The “bank of mum and dad” stepped up, and governments responded with commitments to build more homes, quickly.

Now, in 2026, we've reached a tipping point. Homes are being reimaged as adaptive environments centred on creativity, emotion and care.



Society

After years of hyper-individualism, people are returning to community. In ANZ, 3 in 10 citizens are born abroad (McCrandle, 2025). Diverse identities and shared living needs are reshaping future homes that must serve more people and purposes.



Technology

With AI embedded in daily life, consumers want technology that enhances the home experience. Future smart home solutions must be empathetic, intuitive and trust-building as 59.9% of global consumers question the authenticity of online content (Accenture, 2025).



Environment

As more consumers realise that planet health equals personal health, homes must be designed with nature in mind. Climate change is projected to cause more than 14.5 million deaths globally by 2050 (World Economic Forum, 2024). Climate-readiness is now essential to protecting wellbeing.



Politics

Housing access is under pressure, shaping how future homes must be fairer and more inclusive. Globally, 69% of consumers distrust government leaders (Edelman Trust Barometer, 2025). Consumers continue to demand agency over where and how they live.



Industry

Rising costs, shifting wealth and labour gaps are shaping demand for homes that deliver more value - smarter, more efficient and flexible. Efficiency, adaptability and durability are becoming new aspirations.



Creativity

Emotional uplift is becoming a strategy to push back against the counter pressures of today's world - including economic uncertainty, climate change, and social fragmentation. Homes that spark creativity, play and personal expression will win consumer attention. Globally, 49% of consumers prefer brands that delight (VML, 2023), and 6 in 10 ANZ consumers say that playfulness improves brand perception (TRA, 2024).



Lifestyle themes

Drawn from the STEPIC insights, the following four Lifestyle Themes reflect the dynamic needs, pressures and aspirations among New Zealand homeowners. These themes are not just conceptual, they are grounded in real-world pressures and possibilities. They offer a strategic blueprint for homes that can respond to these cultural, political and economic shifts.

Evolved Living

What's Changing

In the face of rising cost-of-living and environmental pressures, the future homeowner will be more intentional, prioritising not more, but better designed spaces.

Why It Matters

Homes must better serve the needs of its residents through adaptable layouts, durable materials, and features that meet evolving building standards and sustainability benchmarks.

As cost-of-living pressures intensify and environmental urgency grows, homeowners are shifting from scale to intelligence - prioritising better-designed spaces over bigger builds. This theme calls for homes that maximise performance per square metre through adaptable layouts and durable materials.

While the 23% drop in median floor area of new homes between 2004 and 2024 (Stats NZ, 2025) reflects changing spatial preferences, it is the systemic affordability and labour shortages that are accelerating the adoption of homes that deliver more comfort, flexibility and ease with less material, waste, time and labour.



Design Pillars

- **Smart Layouts:** Spaces planned with purpose, maximising usability, flexibility and overall flow.
- **High Performance:** Materials and systems built to last, balancing durability and comfort.
- **Everyday Pride:** Design that aligns itself with the needs of the residents, instilling quiet pride in how a home looks, feels and functions.
- **Calm minimalism:** A calm, uncluttered environment that supports mental clarity and physical renewal.

Creative Living

What's Changing

Consumers are turning to creativity as a path for agency and not just aesthetics. The home becomes a space where joy and play become tools to reclaim wellbeing and build emotional resilience.

Why It Matters

Integrating customisable design elements can set builds apart, boost buyers emotional connection and future-proof homes against industry sameness.

Creativity is no longer a luxury - it's a necessity. In an age of anxiety and burnout, homes must become spaces for joy, play and emotional resilience. This theme positions creativity as a core function of the home, unlocking agency and optimism through expressive design.

As AI becomes embedded in everyday life, it's not only transforming how New Zealanders work, but also reshaping how they care for themselves. With 61% of New Zealanders using or wanting to use AI to assist with tasks (Adobe, 2025), technology is increasingly seen as a partner in creative and personal expression. This aligns with a broader cultural shift: New Zealanders are investing heavily in self-care, spending over NZD\$6,300 annually on wellness (Global Wellness Institute, 2024). Together, these trends signal a growing desire for homes that integrate smart technology to support both emotional wellbeing and creative autonomy.

Creative Living embraces homes with personality. It celebrates imperfection, experimentation and emotional connection. It invites residents to shape their environment, turning the home into a personal playground for identity, culture and joy.



Design Pillars

- **Joyful Maximalism:** Bold palettes, patterns and forms that invite play and personality.
- **Sensorial Design:** Tactile, emotionally uplifting environments for rest and creative reset.
- **Rooted Storytelling:** Design choices that reflect personal history, cultural heritage and evolving identity.

Multigenerational Living

What's Changing

As consumers respond to rising costs, ageing populations and evolving definitions of kinship, more complex households will emerge, calling the need for flexible home settings that balance privacy and family.

Why It Matters

Flexible zonings, secondary dwellings and adaptable layouts will be essential to appeal to buyers pooling resources or accommodating extended family.

As affordability challenges persist and family structures evolve, homes must support co-existence across generations. This theme responds to the rise of complex households, calling for flexible layouts, inclusive design and spaces that balance privacy with connection.

In ANZ, one in five families with parents and children now live in homes with complex family structures including multigenerational (UNSW, 2024). Cultural expectations around family are also reshaping how homes are shared and used. New Zealand is one of the world's most multicultural nations, with a third of its residents born overseas - nearly double the proportion in the UK and US (McCrandle, 2025).

Frugal family living is becoming a long-term financial strategy as families are pooling resources and sharing practical living costs. Secondary dwellings, such as granny flats, offer crucial privacy within proximity. Flexible zoning and adaptable layouts are essential to accommodate diverse needs, from ageing parents to adult children and extended kin.

Multigenerational Living is about designing homes that evolve with life. It's about creating environments that foster togetherness, while respecting individuality. It's about building homes that are inclusive and adaptable.

Autonomous Living

What's Changing

In an era of climate and economic pressures, homeowners will seek spaces that offer independence and support wellbeing through self-sufficiency, automation and low-maintenance design.

Why It Matters

Designing homes that allow ease, whether through renewable systems, durable materials or smart automation will allow greater self-resilience and comfort.

In a world of climate disruption and economic instability, homeowners are seeking independence. Autonomous Living is about designing homes that take care of you - through energy efficiency, automation and low-maintenance systems.

Climate-readiness has become an essential consideration in home design and energy-efficient homes are in demand. As AI becomes more intelligent, consumers are looking for tools that protect trust and connection.

New Zealanders are less trusting about AI than most countries. As well as being wary of AI, New Zealand ranks among the lowest globally on acceptance, excitement and optimism about it, alongside Australia and the Netherlands. Only 44% of New Zealanders believe the benefits of AI outweigh the risks, the lowest ranking of any country (KPMG, 2025). Autonomous Living empowers homeowners to feel supported and in control. It's about designing homes that offer ease, resilience and restorative comfort.

- **Resource Smart:** Homes that optimise energy use through passive design, efficient systems and sustainable materials.
- **Intuitive Design:** Design that feels easy to navigate and use, minimising friction and decision fatigue.
- **Effortless Living:** Design and materials that allow long-time ease, minimising upkeep while supporting comfort and resilience.
- **Quiet Control:** Homes that foster a sense of calm through independence.




